Year 2 – Great Fire of London


In year 2, we explored the Great Fire of London in our learning challenge. As part of this, we designed and made our own fire engines whilst learning design and technology skills.


Year 3

During the Autumn term we continued with our theme of 'Full Steam Ahead' which really seemed to tune into their interests. As part of the topic the children explored seaside holidays and produced some super seaside advertising pictures. The children used printing as part of their art with Mrs Brooke to create pictures in the style of Victorian posters. It was great to see that some children had a go at creating some of their own at home, 'Visit Beautiful Bridlington, how could you not be tempted?'









As part of our conclusion to the topic, and with much excitement, we all headed to the National Railway Museum. During the day we excitedly located the replica Rocket train, Mallard and Royal train. We had two very interactive workshops exploring speed, steam and pressure which saw Mrs Leigh and Mrs Keaney going head to head in a battle! The children represented the school brilliantly, showing plenty of enthusiasm and knowledge. We may even have the next George Stephenson in our year group!

Writing, letters, instructions and story writing all formed part of English during the Autumn half term. We wrote a set of instructions for how to wash a woolly mammoth which helped us to use descriptive language and use of imperative verbs. We also used our best persuasive language to persuade hunters to stop hunting polar bears, a topical and emotive issue.

As usual we continued to embed our key characteristics of independence, problem solving, collaboration and resilience. We will continue to revisit this and already the children are showing greater understanding and are demonstrating them in their learning and at play.

The children carried out research around the topic, created silhouette art work, prepared a cowboy dinner in Cook School and also made their own personal 'Dream-Catcher'.


At the end of the topic, the children were given the opportunity to share and celebrate their homework challenge where each classroom was turned into a museum.

We then had four weeks to prepare three carols for Christmas. The choir were amazing - a rehearsal and three services on one day. They thoroughly deserved their choir party!


