Firstly - road safety

A reminder that there will be no safety patrol crossing this coming week. The Council sadly have not been able to sort any cover for our excellent Ed Lannen, so there will be no official person manning the zebra crossing next week.

Please can everyone take extra care when driving past school or crossing the roads outside school at the start and end of the school day.

The Council have been quite clear with us that we as teachers, are not insured to be manning crossings and that it is parent responsibility to ensure child safety to and from school.

I will endeavour to be at the school gates as often as possible in the mornings next week and I will encourage our end of day staff to move towards the front of school as swiftly as possible too.

It may also be a really good time to talk to your children about road safety. In assembly today, we talked about crossing the road carefully and used the following photograph to discuss why it is not a good place to cross the road between parked cars. This is also in response to some of our kind community members letting us know that some pupils this week had put themselves at risk by doing so this week.

Internally, we will also be looking at how we can make our local environment better and how this can be beneficial to the environment as a whole eg reducing plastic and less use of electricity etc. We have STEM week too just before easter.

In addition, we do facilitate pupils and families holding events after school (eg bake sales).

These of course are much more on an adhoc basis and do require some planning. It is really helpful if there is adult supervision from you for these events. For example, planning the transportation of the cakes, the pricing, bringing a float of change, setting up the tables in readiness are all things that need careful consideration.
