

Sharing the experience

Army childcare survey





The Army Families Federations' (AFF) recent early years childcare survey revealed that Army parents face the same challenges as their civilian counterparts when it comes to finding suitable childcare places. However, the struggle is often intensified by isolation from extended family support.

More than 200 families responded to the survey, sharing their experiences of childcare for under-fives both in the UK and overseas. A key finding was the variation in childcare provision across the different UK nations, which families highlighted as a significant issue.

Why was the survey done?

The survey was carried out by the Army Families Federation (AFF) to better understand the challenges Army families face in accessing early years childcare, both in the UK and overseas.

AFF Head of Policy Rachel Smith explained: "We wanted to understand the individual stories around the barriers that Service personnel and families had around their experience of accessing early years childcare.


"Sharing the experience of Army families in their own words with the MOD was really important to AFF in order for us to be able to advocate for better communication and greater understanding of the issues that families face."

AFF will use the evidence from the survey to help the MOD understand the issues you face. It will advocate for better communication on the childcareoffer to help prevent families from missing out.

Listening to the voices of Service families

SEND Service Children & Young People

Would you like to share your experiences and have your voice heard?

Service children face unique challenges that have the potential to negatively affect their wellbeing and academic performance; such challenges are exacerbated for families who have children with SEND.

I am currently designing a new training programme which will help school staff and professionals reflect on and develop support for Service children with SEND, it's important to consider the unique challenges they face and how tailored, inclusive strategies can better support their education and wellbeing.

Understanding the emotional, social, and academic impact of military life—and recognising the often invisible struggles and hidden vulnerabilities that many of our Armed Forces children & young people face—is fundamental to achieving both cultural and operational excellence.

Through targeted training and strategic activity, we can enhance the quality of support provided to Service children and young people with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities.

This informed approach ensures that support systems are not only inclusive, but also responsive to the unique and evolving needs of this important group of learners

Understanding the lived experiences of families with children and young people with SEND is incredibly valuable in shaping effective, empathetic, and responsive support.

By listening to and learning from these families, we gain critical insight into the challenges the families face and the strengths they bring, enabling us to design support systems that are genuinely inclusive and tailored to real needs.

"We have been rejected for an EHCP once already as 'we're moving and an EHCP will need to come out of another budget not the local budget here"

"Transfer and continuation of care when moving around is a nightmare."

We have moved seven times and he is seven years old. Transition from school to school is horrendous, different counties need different paperwork, my son has had to go through numerous diagnosis to confirm he has ASD."
